

Bibliography of Historical Archaeology in Australia: Part 4

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This is the fourth compilation of entries to a bibliography of historical archaeology in Australia. Previous compilations appeared in the first three volumes of this journal. Over one third of the references presented here are unpublished reports, which are available in most cases only from the library of the client organization, the relevant state heritage agency, or the Australian Heritage Commission. While it is therefore relatively difficult to gain access to these reports, they represent a large proportion of the work being undertaken in Australia in the historical archaeological field, and experience would suggest that little of this material will find its way into publication even in the form of short notes.

This, the fourth instalment of the bibliography, brings the number of references to well over 800 items. It was recognised from the start that the format of this bibliography, lacking annotations or abstracts, left much to be desired. However, the resources available to the compilers and the Society precluded the compilation of more comprehensive bibliographic information, and it was felt that even in its present form the bibliography would be of value to students and researchers. Recently there have been rapid developments in the establishment of on-line bibliographic data-bases, and it would seem appropriate for the Society to attempt to get its particular area of interest incorporated into one of the new data-bases.

The Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organization (CSIRO) has established through its AUSTRALIS network a series of bibliographic data-bases. One of these, HERA, was established in early 1987 under the auspices of the Australian Heritage Commission. HERA, short for Heritage Australia Data-base, will contain references (with abstracts) relating to a wide range of disciplines involved in the conservation field. It will include nature conservation, Aboriginal sites conservation, and historic places conservation, and in the latter category will automatically include quarterly inputs of published and unpublished material in the historical archaeology field, where the work is associated with the conservation of a place, or the study of a place to be conserved. Selected retrospective bibliographic searches in particular fields will also be undertaken to build up the data-base. Hard copy prints of entries in the historical archaeology field would be able to be acquired by the Society, for publication as a supplement of the Journal or Newsletter. Arrangements may be able to be made to expand HERA to include non-conservation-related references, especially if a contributing library can be found to undertake the input of such information.

These new developments, offering as they do more complete and useful access to bibliographic data, may well mean that this will be the last addition to this bibliography to appear in its present form.
